* Despite the complex-looking notation, these are three evenly-spaced pitches connecting the preceding B natural with the following G sharp. As long as the performer hears the G sharp coming, the pitches should take care of themselves after a few tries. (For the technical-minded, the three intervening notes are a B natural lowered by 3/8 of a tone, a B flat lowered by 1/4 of a tone, and an A natural lowered by 1/8 of a tone)





^{*} The placement of x-shaped noteheads on the staff indicates the relative pitches of the individual bells.

** Place these bell attacks as they align with the written text

*** Short "a" sound, as in "hat"
